

Major Richard Call


On the 28th ult. departed this life, at the Rock-Landing, Major Richard Call, of the 1ft United States regiment.—On the 29th at 6 o'clock in the evening, his remains were interied with the honors of war, bydifcharge

of minute guns from the fort, and three volices of mulketry by eight files of infatury, at the grave — At an early flage of the inte war, Major Cail took up arms in defence of his country; and on feveral occasions diffinguithed himfelf as a brave and deferving officer. His conduct at the battle at the Cowpen, acquired him the spplaufe of his fellowcitizens, and respect of the Commander in Chief: — To definente his private charafter, or expating on his public fervices, is not our intention. It is fufficient to fay, that he was so brave officer, a zealous patriot, a warm and fleady friend, and an affectionate butband.


Richard Call



After the American Revolution, the US Army was reduced to a smaller size and at one time reorganized into the "American Legion." A portion of the Army, or a Sub-Legion was stationed at Rock Landing, Ga; this was about 3-5 miles south of Milledgeville, GA. The commander of the legion at that location was Major Richard Call, a Revolutionary War Veteran. In recent research it has been discovered he died while on active duty there at Fort Fidius. He was buried with Military honors nearby, but we do not know where.

We are thankful for the Service of Major Call and all our Patriots.
