VFW Post 5255 In Lawrenceville honors Flag Day

On June 15, citizens and dignitaries from around Georgia gathered at VFW Post 5255 in Lawrenceville to celebrate the 247th anniversary of the adoption of the "Stars and Stripes" as the official Flag of the United States of America. It was not until an Act of Congress in 1949 that June 14th became known as National Flag Day.

Ceremony arrangements were planned by the Gwin-nett Flag Day Committee with the theme of "Celebrating America and Honoring Our Flag." This year's event included the addition of a Flag Retirement Ceremony, providing attendees with the opportunity to dispose of an American Flag that was no longer serviceable and in a manner that shows dignity and respect. Boy Scouts from Troops 50, 81, 231, and 506 demonstrated this process using a flag previously flown over the U.S. Capitol and provided by the Office of Congresswoman Lucy Mc-Beth during the 2023 Flag Day Ceremony.

My Patriot

Revolutionary Discovery

Descendant of Mathieu Devaux dit Platillo, a French national who served under Bernardo de Gálvez, seeks to make America's founding story more inclusive.

Like many aspects of the American Revolution, Jane Henderson Bronner's connection to the war is not covered in the typical history textbook. Growing up in the 1970s, she learned that the American Revolution took place in the 13 Colonies, not Spanish Louisiana. She learned that the Patriots were Colonists, certainly not merchants from far-flung places like France.

"Discovering that I had ties to the Revolutionary Warwas as urprise in and of itself" said Mrs. Bronner a member of Atlanta DAR Chapter, Atlanta, Georgia. "Discovering that my Patriot was part of an unexpected, untold side of the story has made it all the more exciting."

Mrs. Bronner's Patriot, Mathieu Devaux dit Platillo, was a merchant from Marseille, France, who served in the New Orleans militia during the Revolutionary War under General Bernard o de Gálvez, the colonial governor of Spanish Louisiana at the time.

Gálvez is credited with supporting America's quest for freedom through direct and indirect methods. After blockading the Port of New Orleans, which prevented British boats from entering the Mississippi River, he provided direct aid in the form of arms, ammunition, supplies and money. Additionally, when Spain officially joined the war in 1779, strategic campaigns against the British in present-day Alabama and Florida helped pave the way for America's victory at Yorktown. (Read more about Gálvez on page 36.)

As with many Patriots, what is known about Platillo's military service comes from sparsely worded military records. He was born in February 1737 in Marseille, France. Sometime between 1760 and 1770, he arrived in New Orleans for reasons unknown but most likely because he was a merchant. A local militia member, he served in the artillery under Gálvez in the Battle of Baton Rouge in September 1779. Spain, which had entered the Revolutionary War just months earlier, dealt a decisive blow to the British at Baton Rouge, effectively stripping them of their Mississippi River access.

Mrs. Bronner has reason to believe that her Patriot was more to Gálvez than just a militiaman, thanks to a document discovered by her brother, Michael Henderson, a retired lieutenant commander of the U.S. Navy, a family historian and past president of Button Gwinnett Chapter Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), Gwinnett County Georgia.

The document in question—the manumission papers of Agnes Mathieu, the siblings' fourth-generation great-grandmother—was the subject of a 2010 episode of PBS's "History Detectives." The siblings were interested in the document because of its signer. While local clerks signed most emancipation documents of that time, this one featured the unmistakable signature of Gálvez.

"Why would Bernardo de Gálvez have signed my great-grandmother's manumission document three months after the Battle of Baton Rouge if not for some relationship between him and my great-grandfather, who fought under him?" she said. "I believe in all my heart this was his gift and reward for my great-grandfather's service—to grant her freedom."

Just as the Revolutionary War part of Mrs. Bronner's story is outside of what she learned in school, so is her Patriot's love story.

"We learned that white men were not allowed to be with Black women, and yet, here are my fourth-generation great-grandfather and great-grandmother not only living together but also having children and making a life together."

According to Platillo's will, discovered by Mrs. Bronner's brother, the couple had six children who survived to a dulthood and five grand children.

"Because of the laws of that day, my great-grandfather was not able to leave property to my great-grandmother," she said. "But in his will, he did state clearly that she was the mother of his children."

After 30 years of researching their family's Louisiana history, Michael joined SAR, becoming the first African American inducted into the Georgia Society SAR. Their mother, Frances Phillips Henderson, later became a member of New Orleans DAR Chapter, New Orleans, Louisiana. Mrs. Bronner joined the Atlanta DAR Chapter earlier this year.

"I believe that it's important for me to have joined, especially at a time like this, because I understand now that my story represents a different perspective on the American Revolution," she said. "On the eve of the 250th anniversary of our nation's founding, it's important that we tell this story in all its fullness, not just for people like me so that we can know and understand that we belong too, but for all Americans, so that all of us can understand and appreciate that diverse individuals came together—and still do—to create the rich tapestry that is America."

Since becoming a Daughter, Mrs. Bronner has wasted no time getting involved. She has attended her Georgia State Conference, completed the New Members Course, attended a naturalization ceremony in Atlanta, made appearances at several events hosted by the Georgia Society SAR and logged a dozen Service to America hours for recognizing the security department at the hospital where she works on Employee Appreciation Day. "I wanted to honor the unsung heroes—the officers that keep our hospital safe," she said. "They were so appreciative but also shocked because they said no one had ever recognized them before."



No matter how she gets plugged into the organization, she knows recruiting new members will be part of her role. "An A frican proverb states that until the lion has his own story teller, the hunter will always have the best part of the story," she said. "I want to encourage all women to know their story, be their own story teller and embrace whatever they find."

Mrs. Bronner's journey to understanding her family's history is far from over. Many questions remain about her great-grandparents in Louisiana, including why Platillo came to America in the first place, how his property and wealth were distributed after his death, and whether he would have considered his American dream achieved—questions to which Mrs. Bronner and her brother intend to uncover answers.

"Family history is like an onion, and we're slowly peeling back the layers to reveal more of our story," she said.

Do you Qualify for the National Society Sons of the American Revolution War Service or Military Service Medals?

As part of the Button Gwinnett SAR Chapter 25th Anniversary Celebration to be held on April 6, 2024 we would like to recognize our Chapter Compatriots who served in any branch of the U.S. Military by presenting you with either the National Society Sons of the American Revolution War Service Medal or Military Service Medal if you have not previously received either of them from our Chapter.

Compatriots Bill Palmer and Bruce Maney have agreed to be Co-Chairs of the Veterans Medal Committee.

In accordance with the NSSAR Official Handbook, Volume V: Individual Medals, Awards and Certificates, updated January 1, 2024, pages 17 and 18, shown below, <u>Proof of Military Service (DD-214 form)</u> must be presented by the member to the Chapter Secretary, who will determine the Chapter Member's eligibility for the War Service Medal or Military Service Medal.





SAR Medals and Their Order of Precedence (1-50)

- 1. SAR Bedge
- 2. Minuteman Medal
- 3. Gold Good Citizenship Medal
- 4. War Service Medal
- 4. Military Service Medal
- 5. Heroism Medal
- 6. National Society Medal of Distinguished Service



NSSAR Handbook V: War Service Medal - Proof of Service:

Proof of service, in the form of a copy of the member's discharge (or other U.S. or Allied Government proof in the case of a member in active service), must be presented to the NSSAR Veterans Recognition Committee, State Society Secretary or Chapter secretary (depending on presenting authority) before the medal can be purchased and/or worn.

Such proof must show that the Compatriot:

- 1. served, or is serving, honorably in: a. the armed forces of the United States, b. the military forces of a country allied with the United States, or c. a United Nations Peace Keeping Force; and
- served against a common enemy in a war or action recognized by a branch of the Armed Forces of the United States;
 and Effective: January 1, 2024 18
- received a campaign medal, combat ribbon or badge as shown on the DD-214 form (or equivalent).
 Bronze bars are available indicating service in WWII, Korea, Vietnam, Southwest Asia, Kosovo, Iraq, Afghanistan, and the Global War on Terrorism.

<u>Subsequent Presentation Authorized:</u> A Compatriot may receive additional Bronze Service Bars or Oak Leaf Clusters for subsequent qualifying war service.

Note: The National Defense Service Medal is not considered a campaign medal for purposes of qualifying for the War Service Medal.

NSSAR Handbook V: Military Service Medal - Proof of Service:

Proof of service, in the form of a copy of the member's discharge (or other U.S. or Allied

Government proof in the case of a member in active service), must be provided to the NSSAR Veterans

Recognition Committee, State Society Secretary or Chapter Secretary (depending on presenting authority) before the medal can be purchased and/or worn.

Such proof Effective: January 1, 2024 - 19 - must show that the Compatriot:

- 1. served, or is serving, honorably in the armed forces of the United States,
- 2. the military forces of a country allied with the United States, or
- 3. a United Nations Peace Keeping Force.

<u>Subsequent Presentation NOT Authorized:</u> A Compatriot may receive this medal only once. Oak leaf clusters or other ribbon attachments are not authorized.

The Daughters of Liberty Medal is the highest lady's medal and consideration in awarding this medal should be given only after the SAR Medal of Appreciation or the Martha Washington Medal has been presented.

It may be presented to a lady recommended by any officer of a Chapter, State or National Society, SAR in appreciation for her unselfish devotion, tireless efforts and assistance to the SAR, and who has dedicated her time, energy, ability and/or finances to the organization in support and furtherance of the stated objectives of the SAR.

Patriot Spotlight - Enoch and David Danforth

On July 24, 1779 - The Battle of Castine began on Penobscot Bay in Maine.

Two of the Patriots of Button Gwinnett SAR Chapter members Scott, Robert and Gray Jacques were Enoch Danforth who was a sailor on the "Vengeance" and his son David who was a private in Col. Samuel McCobb's regiment.

The Penobscot Expedition was a 44-ship American naval armada during the Revolutionary War assembled by the Provincial Congress of the Province of Massachusetts Bay.

The flotilla of 19 warships and 25 support vessels sailed from Boston on July 19, 1779 for the upper Penobscot Bay in the District of Maine carrying an expeditionary force of more than 1,000 American colonial marines (not to be confused with the Continental Marines) and militiamen. Also included was a 100-man artillery detachment under the command of Lt. Colonel Paul Revere. (Yes the same Paul Revere who was a member of the Boston Tea Party and the Alarm of April 19, 1775).

The Expedition's goal was to reclaim control of mid-coast Maine from the British who had captured it a month earlier, naming the newly British territory New Ireland. It was the largest American naval expedition of the war.


The fighting took place on land and at sea around the mouth of the Penobscot and Bagaduce Rivers at Castine, Maine over a period of three weeks in July and August 1779.

The Expedition was the United States' worst naval defeat until Pearl Harbor 162 years later, in 1941.



Castine Maine is located less than 20 miles from where Lynn Baxter & Tom Jacques grew up in Verona Island and Bucksport respectively. Lynn also had a Patriot Ancestor John Gilkey who was held as a prisoner of war in Castine during the American Revolution.

Both of these Patriots are ancestors of Philadelphia Winn DAR Chapter, Honorary Regent, Lynn Baxter Jacques.

DANFORD, DAVID. Private, Capt. Benjamin Lemont's co., Col. Samuel McCobb's regt.; enlisted July 9, 1779; discharged Sept. 24, 1779; service, 2 mos. 15 days, at Penobscot.
